#### About the Pittsburgh Playwright: August Wilson



Born Frederick August Kittel, Jr. in Pittsburgh in 1945, as the fourth of seven children, August Wilson grew up in the impoverished Bedford Avenue area of the city. The family moved from there when his mother remarried and Wilson attended school; he dropped out at 16 and focused on working in menial jobs, while fostering his burgeoning love of the written word with trips to the Carnegie Library. Reading the works of Langston Hughes and Ralph Ellison embedded a desire within the teenage Wilson to become a writer, though his mother wanted him to pursue a career in law. Disagreements over this decision led to Wilson leaving the family home. He intended to spend three years in the army, but he left after a year and returned to Pittsburgh to work in various

jobs.

After his father's death in 1965, Frederick Kittel Jr became August Wilson, a decision made to honor his mother. The late sixties saw Wilson become heavily influenced by Malcolm X and the blues, and he converted to Islam to sustain his 1969 marriage to Brenda Burton. A year earlier, Wilson set up the Black Horizon Theater with Rob Penny where his first plays, *Recycling* and *Jitney*, were performed.

Wilson divorced in 1972, and in 1976 saw a production of *Sizwe Banzi is Dead* at the Pittsburgh Public Theater, the first time he'd seen a professional play. Two years later the budding playwright moved to St. Paul, Minnesota, where he worked writing educational scripts for the Science Museum of Minnesota. The Playwrights' Center in Minnesota awarded him a fellowship in 1980 and he left his job a year later. He continued writing plays while working as a chef for the Little Brothers of the Poor.

In Minnesota, Wilson built a strong relationship with the Penumbra Theatre Company, which produced many of his plays in the eighties. In 1987 the city named May 25th August Wilson Day, after his Pulitzer Prize award in the same year. Wilson left St. Paul for Seattle in 1990, after his second marriage, to Judy Oliver, ended in divorce, and while there the Seattle Repertory Theatre performed a number of his plays.

In 1995 Wilson received an honorary degree from the University of Pittsburgh, one of many, where he became a Doctor of Humanities and was a member of the Board of Trustees. He married again in 1994, to Constanza Romero. In 2005 he was diagnosed with liver cancer, and in October of that year, he passed away.

Nixon. He was a member of timespace, for which he produced hamletmachine and directed 4-H Club and Insignificance. For PPTCO Mark directed The Revenants, Comfort Zone, and several one-acts for the annual Black & White Festival. He has directed Cry Havoc, Taking Sides, and Fool for Love for other local theaters. Mark is Resident Sound Designer for PPTCO and The Unseam'd Shakespeare Company, and has designed for many local theaters. Mark won Onyx awards for best sound design three straight years for his work on PPTCO's annual August Wilson productions. He was named best sound designer and listed among the best directors in City Paper's 2001 theater round-up, and was named best sound designer of 2000 by the Pittsburgh Post-Gazette. Mark was a founding producer of the Dark Night Cabaret performance series, and has produced and directed music videos for several local bands.

Cheryl El-Walker (Costume/Makeup) is an award-winning costume designer and makeup artist who is also a veteran stage actor from Pittsburgh. She has provided her skills for seven of August Wilson's full-length productions. Her creative theatre work has earned her several Onyx awards from the African American Council for the Arts (AACTA): Best Make-up Artist (2007); Christmas Is Coming Uptown (Best Costume for a Musical 2008); New Horizon Theatre, Freeman (Best Leading Actress 2008); Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company, (Best Costume Design for a Play 2008, 2009, 2010, 2012) and the PPTCO 2012 Legacy Award. In 2013, she received PPTCO's Theater Festival in Black and White Award for Best Director. Most recently, Cheryl was seen on the PPTCO stage as "LaRue" in Dinah! The Musical.

**Joseph Martinez** (Fight Choreographer) is delighted to be a part of August Wilson's *Fences*. He has had the privilege and honor to work with director Mark Clayton Southers on several projects as fight choreographer. Past fight choreographer credits include *August in August*, August Wilson Center; *The Gammage Project*, Pitt Rep; *Ma Noah*, PPTCO; *Johnny Lee Hooker*, *Jr. Story*, 700 Club- ABC Family. Joseph is currently performing in *Othello* at The Pittsburgh Public Theater.

#### **About the Director: Mark Clayton Southers**

Mark Clayton Southers is an award winning playwright, photographer, scenic designer, theatrical producer and stage director. He and his family reside in Pittsburgh's historic Hill District. He is the founder and Producing Artistic Director of the Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company where he has produced over 140 full length and one-act plays, including August Wilson's entire ten play Pittsburgh Century-Cycle.

Mr. Southers is a published poet and playwright as well. His play, Ma Noah, was the recipient of the 2004 Theodore Ward prize at Columbia College, Chicago. His poem play, End Angered Species AKA Angry Black Man Poetry, had a successful run at Teatr Slaski in Katowice, Poland in 2009.



Some of his favorite directing credits include Paul Robeson for the Griot Ensemble Theatre Company; Pill Hill and Freeman for New Horizon Theatre; Almost Maine for South Park Theatre; the August in February Series for the Pittsburgh Cultural Trust; Dutchman for Bricolage Production Company; Angry Black Men Poetry for Teatr Slaski; Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Piano Lesson and Radio Golf for American Stage Theatre, St. Petersburg, Florida; Gem of the Ocean for Human Race Theatre, Dayton, Ohio; Passing Strange for North Short Stage, Columbus, Ohio; Papa Doc and Paul Robeson for The Trilogy Opera Company and Dorothy Six, Sty of The Blind Pig for The Banyan Theatre Company, Sarasota, FL, The Piano Lesson, Two Trains Running, Seven Guitars, VALU-MART, Jitney and Gem of the Ocean for the Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company.
