



### WELCOME



This August Wilson play holds a special place in my heart. It's the play that ushered me into the world of theatre. My first career was that of a photographer. I worked for the New Pittsburgh Courier from 1980 through 1992. I was also the company photographer for the Kuntu Repertory Theatre Company during that time; however I never watched any plays. I would just show up prior to a performance or a dress rehearsal, take a series of photographs and then leave.

One day the founder and artistic director Dr. Vernell Lillie asked if I knew anyone who could videotape a performance. I had just purchased a Betamax video camera and was videotaping various functions. I told her that I could do it. So, now here I am in the Stephen Foster Memorial theater sitting through my first full-length play production. I set up in the

back of the theater so that I could navigate the huge stage. This location worked well for me because it also was a good distance from the audience and no one could hear me talk on my Nokia bag phone. Yes, it's true. It was 1984 and my phone calls were clocking in at 25 cents per minute. So the play is going on and I'm on my phone chatting with a friend, in a hushed tone, of course. I'm minding my business and all of a sudden I hear one of the actors cussing out God at the top of his voice.

It actually raised the hairs on my arms. I immediately sat up and told my friend on the phone, "I'm gonna hafta hit you back later." I hung up and commenced to watch the rest of the performance. That actor was the late great Don Marshall, who we just lost several weeks ago. In the role of Levee, he commanded the stage with an ignorant type of swagger that fit his character well. The late great Milt Thompson was also onstage as Cutler, and my good friend and great Griot, the late Bob Gore, was there as Toledo. This experience didn't cause me to immediately jump into theatre; however, it subconsciously had an effect on my thoughts about the world of theatre. This play impacted me enough to have an understanding that theatre can move you. Emotionally it can take you places and hold your attention and teach as well. Ma Rainey's Black Bottom is at the top of my list of Mr. Wilson's American Century Cycle. It's a piece of art that allows us to experience the joy, pain, laughter and tragedy of African Americans in a time that came before us. It's a wonderful roller coaster of emotions. Please fasten your seat belts and prepare yourselves for a journey into and through the world of Mr. August Wilson.

**PLAYWRIGHT | AUGUST WILSON** (April 27, 1945-October 2, 2005) authored *Gem of the Ocean, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, The Piano Lesson, Seven Guitars, Fences, Two Trains Running, Jitney, King Hedley II, and Radio Golf.* These works explore the heritage and experience of the descendants of Africans brought to North America, decade-bydecade, over the course of the twentieth century.

These plays form a compilation entitled The American Century Cycle. Mr. Wilson's plays have been produced on Broadway, at regional theaters across the country and all over the world. In 2003, he made his professional stage debut in his one-man

show, How I Learned What I Learned. His works garnered many awards including Pulitzer Prizes for Fences (1987) and for The Piano Lesson (1990); a Tony Award for Fences; Great Britain's Olivier Award for Jitney and Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, as well as seven New York Drama Critics Circle Awards for Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Fences, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, The Piano Lesson, Two Trains Running, Seven Guitars, and Jitney. Additionally, the cast recording of Ma Rainey's Black Bottom received a 1985 Grammy Award, and Mr. Wilson received a 1995 Emmy Award nomination for his screenplay adaptation of The Piano Lesson. Mr. Wilson's early works included the one-act plays The Janitor, Recycle, The Coldest Day of the Year, Malcolm X, The Homecoming, and the musical satire Black Bart and the Sacred Hills. Mr. Wilson received many fellowships and awards, including the Rockefeller and Guggenheim Fellowships in Playwriting, the Whiting Writers Award, 2003 Heinz Award, was awarded the 1999 National Humanities Medal by President Bill Clinton, and received numerous honorary degrees from colleges and universities, as well as the only high school diploma ever issued by the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh. He was an alumnus of New Dramatists, a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, a 1995 inductee into the American Academy of Arts and Letters, and on October 16, 2005, Broadway renamed the theater located at 245 West 52nd Street - The August Wilson Theatre. Today, he is considered one of America's finest playwrights. New York Public Radio recorded all ten plays in The American Century Cycle at the Greene Space, casting many of the actors that worked on the original productions. PBS aired a documentary on Mr. Wilson entitled, "The Ground On Which I Stand," as part of the American Masters series. A feature film adaptation of Fences released in 2016 won the Best Picture Oscar and many more awards. Mr. Wilson was born and raised in the Hill District of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and lived in Seattle, Washington at the time of his death in 2005. He is immediately survived by his two daughters, Sakina Ansari and Azula Carmen Wilson, and his wife, costume designer Constanza Romero, who is the executor of his estate.

### **BIOGRAPHIES**

**DIRECTOR | MARK CLAYTON SOUTHERS** and his family of five reside in Pittsburgh's historic Hill District. He is an award-winning playwright, photographer, scenic designer, theatrical producer and stage director. He is the founder and producing Artistic Director of the Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company where he has produced well over 150 full-length and one-act plays, including August Wilson's complete ten play American Century Cycle. Mr. Southers is a published poet and playwright as well. His play *Ma Noah* was the recipient of the 2004 Theodore Ward prize at Columbia College, Chicago. His poem play *Angry Black Man Poetry aka End Angered Species* had a successful run at Teatr Śląski in Katowice, Poland in 2009. His play *Miss Julie, Clarissa and John* was featured at the 2017 National Black Theatre Festival and also had a three week run at the 2017 Edinburgh Festival Fringe in Scotland. He was the Artistic Director for the 2016 year-long August Wilson Festival at Short North Stage in **Columbus** Ohio. Mark is a member of the Dramatist Guild of America, a board member of the August Wilson House and the former Artistic Director of the August Wilson Center in Pittsburgh PA.

**PRODUCTION MANAGER, D.I.A.P.** | **MONTEZE FREELAND** has worked with PPTCO since 2013. He's managed the productions of *Hercules Didn't Wade in the Water, Lights Out, Findings, Seven Guitars, Dulcy* and *The Piano Lesson.* In 2015 he organized the Theatre Festival in Black & White and returned as Assistant to the Director of the festival in 2016. In 2017, he directed *Miss Julie, Clarissa and John* at PPTCO, at the National Black Theatre Festival, and at the 2017 Festival Fringe. He is an accomplished actor and was named 2017 Performer of the Year by the Pittsburgh Post Gazette. "As always, it's a pleasure to watch the artists create through their talents."

**ASSISTANT DIRECTOR | KHALIL LEE** is a native of Pittsburgh. While attending Morris Brown College he strengthened his artistic craft and playwriting at Alliance Theatre in Atlanta, Georgia. He furthered his acting experience by performing in several noted productions in Pittsburgh under the direction of Mark Southers in *Hambone, Voice, Two Trains Running,* and *Uprise*.

SCENIC DESIGNER, TECHNICAL DIRECTOR, SET CONSTRUCTION, SCENIC PAINTER | DIANE MELCHITZKY has designed and built Pittsburgh Playwrights sets since our 2003 debut. She recently worked as a carpenter on the movie Fences directed by Denzel Washington. Most recent projects include set design for the Gateway High School and various exhibits at the Clemente Museum and the August Wilson Center.

ASSISTANT STAGE MANAGER, LIGHTING TECHNICIAN, D.I.A.P. | ASHLEY SOUTHERS is a D.I.A.P. (Do-it-all-person) in training at the Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company. She has worked in the box office, as a lighting tech, costume assistant, house manager, stage manager, assistant stage manager as well as directed for the Theatre Festival in Black & White. She is currently a Senior at Point Park University majoring in creative writing.



**LEVEE | JONATHAN BERRY** is very excited to be playing Levee in this Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre production of *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom*. He has performed on Pittsburgh Playwrights Theatre Company's stage as Floyd Barton in *Seven Guitars*, Youngblood in the 2016 staged reading of *Jitney* and Citizen Barlow in *Gem of the Ocean*. He won an Onyx Award in 2007 for playing Joe in *Pill Hill*. He has since had the pleasure of working with the Shona Sharif African Dance and Drum Ensemble (Langston Hughes' *Black Nativity* for 18 years), as well as productions for the Theatre Factory, Bricolage, the Organic Theater, the Human Race Theatre Company of Dayton, Ohio, City Theatre, and New Horizon Theater. MA RAINEY | VANESSA GERMAN is a multidisciplinary citizen artist. She works in performance, photography, and sculpture. She has written several evening-length spoken word operas, among them, "root", which was developed in her time as an August Wilson Fellow. She is a founding member of the August Wilson Center Theater Ensemble, and she's a 2018 United States Artists Fellow.



**TOLEDO | WALI JAMAL** has the distinction of having appeared in all ten of August Wilson's American Century Cycle plays for PPTCO! He recently portrayed August Wilson himself in Mr. Wilson's autobiographical solo show *How I Learned What I Learned*, making him the only actor in the world to appear in all eleven of August Wilson's plays! A long-time favorite of PPTCO audiences, his roles in our productions of August Wilson's plays include: both Boy Willie and Avery in our two productions of *The Piano Lesson*, Hedley in *Seven Guitars* (twice!), Wolf in *Two Trains Running*, Bono in *Fences*, Doub in *Jitney*, Caesar in *Gem of the Ocean*, Toledo in *Ma Rainey's Black Bottom*, Sterling in *Radio Golf*, Seth Holly in *Joe Turner's Come and Gone*, and Elmore in *King Hedley II*. A prolific Pittsburgh actor, he has worked with just about every theatre company in Pittsburgh, including the Public, City, Bricolage, and barebones.



SLOW DRAG | SAM LOTHARD was born in Youngstown Ohio and now resides in Pittsburgh PA. He has written, directed, and performed plays for over ten years, most recently as Mister in August Wilson's King Hedley II.
